Dispatcher Basic Training Course

All Law Enforcement dispatchers are welcome to take the POST Dispatcher training Course. Supervisors are responsible for filling out the forms and submitting them to POST.

In order to start the course, the student must be registered in the nvelearn system https://nvelearn.nv.gov. Once registered, the agency supervisor must submit the Dispatcher Basic Training Enrollment form to POST. The student will then be notified, via email, when the course has been opened. They will have 180 days to complete this course.

Once a course topic has been completed, they must pass the exam for that topic in order to proceed. If the exam is failed twice, the student must wait 30 days before retaking the course. (After 30 days, the Supervisor can contact POST for re-enrollment). At the end of this course is a Final Exam, and upon successful completion of the Final Exam, the student will be issued a POST Dispatcher Training Certificate of Completion.

Once the Training course has been completed, and the dispatcher meets all requirements under NAC289.340 and listed below, the Supervisor can apply for the Dispatcher Certificate. These requirements are:

- They are currently employed as a law enforcement dispatcher
- They are an authorized user of the National Crime Information Center and able to access the system to make inquiries
- They have successfully passed the online Dispatcher Basic Training course and the certificate of completion is included with this form
- They have filled out the required child support form prescribed by the Division of Welfare and Supportive services of the Department of Health and Human Services pursuant to NRS 425.520 and have included it with this form
- They have successfully complete the agency new dispatcher training program
- They have successfully completed the agencies probationary period

A Disturbing but Typical Fitness Trend

In the academy, POST wants new recruits to appreciate and enjoy physical training or PT. Unconditionally, we want the cadets to improve their Physical Fitness Training throughout the academy. The PPFT (POST Physical Fitness Test) is a scientifically validated job test analysis. In fact, the very purpose of physical fitness testing and standards is to identify who can and who cannot perform critical and essential physical job functions.

To improve a recruit's fitness, they have to be challenged in their PT, learning to push past mental barriers and come to the realization that typically the mind gives up before the body does. Therefore, the recruit's PT needs to be both demanding and illuminating. True success comes when the recruit learns to enjoy PT and welcomes the physical and mental challenges it brings. Their training, skills and tools (i.e., weapons) will compensate for their lack of fitness. If you need confirmation of this, look at social media's memes and YouTube videos criticizing and belittling overweight cops.

In a society riddled with an ever increasing obesity and diabetes epidemic, our warriors, our front line against a never ceasing enemy, must come to the realization that their fitness level not only could save their lives but the lives of those they have sworn to protect Additionally, a lack of fitness could cut short a well-deserved retirement.
